The children sang in their finished fashion under the eagle eye of their director, Richard Westbrock, voices blending beautifully and all the pertinent points of splendid singing being handled to the utmost satisfaction of everyone. For many of those who packed the auditorium it was a first performance, and to them not only the singing but the entire decorum of the youngsters was a revelation. The children sang the "Invocation to St. Cecelia" reverently. They put joy into the lilting measures of Tschaikowsky's "Sleeping Beauty" waltz. Their "Prayer" by Humperdinck and Vittoria's "Ave Maria" again found them in more serious mood, from which they turned gaily to the lighter measures of "Cossack Cradle Song"; "A Violin Singing in the Street." an Ukrainian folksong, and Lasso's "Echo Song."

With the lights revealing hardly more than their faces, they concluded the program with their annual masterpiece, "Silent Night," which the children do so effectively that it touches something down deep inside the listener, Mary Werner McCash and Isabel Herbst were the efficient accompanists.

Sovey, who among his recent work staged "Arsenic and Old Lace," declared in a short talk that what he does for the chorus here is more exciting than any of his other tasks. "What is going to become of our culture if children have not learned the joy of singing?" he asked-which seems a fair question with only one satisfactory answer. Siegfried Weng, museum director, characterized the institute a community living-room with its varied activities. He told us afterward that more than 1,400 persons visited the place yesterday, almost a record.

## **Inland Children's Chorus** To Sing At Art Institute

SECOND public appearance of the Inland Children Singers will be made Sunday at the Dayton Art Institute at 5 p. m., for the first program sponsored by the Chamher of Commerce music committee. The chorus' previous program this season was its annual Christmas concert with the Dayton Philharmonic orchestra.

The chorus, which is directed by Richard Westbrock, is comprised of 100 young singers who have been chosen carefully for the concert. Mary Werner MacCash is accompanist for the group.

Since one of the most unique angles to the appearance of the Inland chorus is the exquisite settings arranged for the ensemble, Raymond Soby, noted stage designer who most recently designed the sets for the production "Arsenic and Old Lace," arrived in Dayton Saturday to supervise plans for the performance. The familiar blue and silver theme which is associated with the Inland chorus will be repeated in the Art Institute auditorium.
