

Protegee Of Inland Chorus In Big Time

Singing on the radio is not new to Barbara Cameron, but the splendid training which she received as a member of the Inland Children's Chorus no doubt has been of great help to her in gaining her present position of sustaining singer on radio station WLW, Cincinnati.

Her current radio schedule includes, "Moon River" on Saturday and Sunday nights; "Crossroads Cafe" on Thursday, and she will be heard soon on Sunday, in a new WLW program. She also sings on the "Petticoat Parade" program over station WSAI at 12:30 p. m. Thursday.

Miss Cameron, regarded as a top-flight radio vocalist, was a member of the Inland Children's Chorus for three years. During that time she received three scholarships for individual training under Richard Westbrook, chorus director.

five years old, at which time she was heard on Helen Blue's "Children's Hour" over station WING, then known as station WSMK.

Miss Cameron is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Cameron, 816 Upland avenue, and graduated last June from Roosevelt High School, where she was editorial director of the "Times."

Jingle singer appears with Cincinnati Symphony

The first commercial jingles singer ever to perform as guest soloist with the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra, Miss Cameron and The Satisfiers, a New York quartet in which she sings the female lead, appeared with the 100-piece orchestra in Cincinnati in a musical "Theatre Train" of Broadway show tunes. It was her third performance with the Cincinnati Symphony.

Miss Cameron and The Satisfiers have performed in commercials for many national advertisers including Newport, Winston and Kent cigarettes, Frosty root beer, Lee's carpets, Mohawk Airlines and McGregor's sportswear. They also have done commercials, as yet not released, for Sophia Loren's new motion picture, "Madame."
