


Memorial Hall, completed January 1910, was dedicated as a memorial for local soldiers who served in the Civil and Spanish-American Wars. In 1955, a citizen's committee, including J. D. O'Brien, directed a restoration completed in 1956. Memorial Hall in Dayton was added to the National Register of Historic Places on July 14, 1988. The Inland Children's Chorus performed at Memorial Hall for 34 years.
