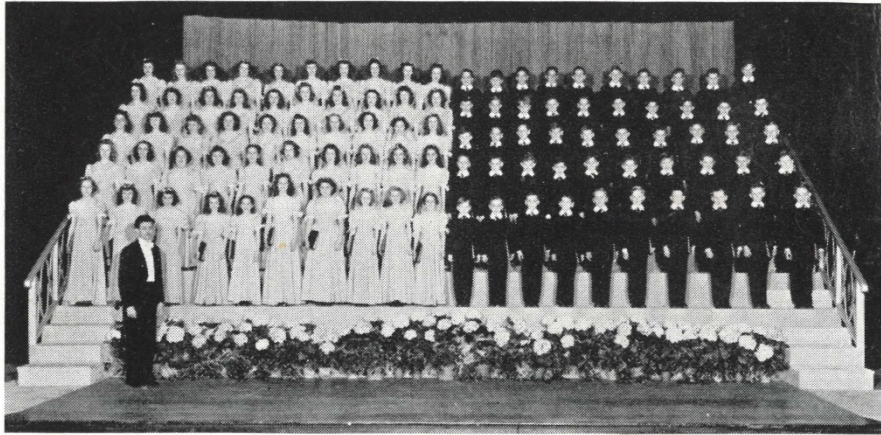

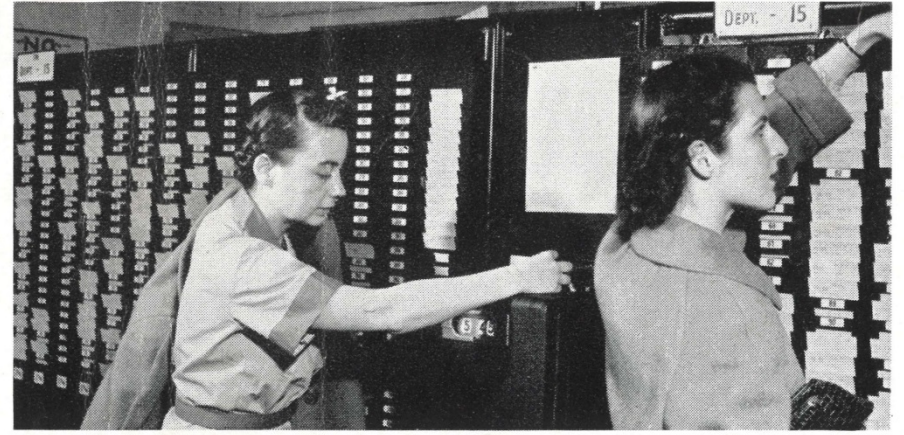
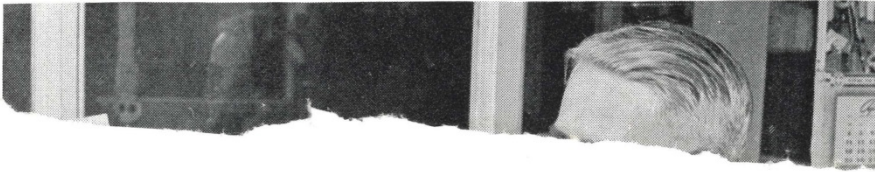

"Buddy"-Shifters Try a Split Trick

Inland's first "buddy" shift was successfully undertaken by two women reporters who split a trick in the Carbine Assembly for a week, learning that double jobs didn't necessarily impair a worker's efficiency.

The reporters were Grace Johnson and Flo Crawford. Their activities here appeared as a feature story in the May 9th issue of the Sunday Journal-Herald. The girls offer their experience as one solution of the labor shortage problem.

The story braised the 3000-

well as factory conditions here.

"We discovered our impression of factories was all wrong," the story read. "Instead of having dirty debris-filled and gloomy departments, each room was surprisingly clean and light-filled."

Miss Johnson was assigned to work from 3 p. m. to 7 p. m. and Miss Crawford the balance of the shift. The girls are shown in the photograph as one checks in and the other out. Miss Johnson is punching out at the co-
