Inland Children's Chorus To Give Two Programs At Art Institute

Two of Dayton's leading pianists, Alverda Sinks Fitzgerald and Mary Blue Morris, will appear in a recital of duo-piano music at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday in the auditorium of First Unitarian church. The concert is open to the public free of charge.

The Dayton Chamber Music society is the sponsor. William J. Hamilton is to be chairman.

The pianists will appear in the presentation of Brahms' "Variations on a Theme of Haydn" and in Rachmaninoff's "Suite No. II." With a chamber orchestra conducted by Alexander Melli, the duo-pianists will present Bach's "Concerto in C Minor for Two Pianos and Strings."

Melli, at one time a conductor of the Riga Symphony orchestra, Latvia, came recently to Dayton from Europe as a displaced person. His appearances in Dayton Chamber Music society concerts are his first in this country.

Inland Chorus Sings

The Inland Children's chorus, directed by Richard Westbrock will present a program at 2:30 p.m. and again at 4:30 p.m. tomorrow in the Dayton Art institute auditorium.

With the two performances the sponsors hope to accommodate the large following of this popular chorus. These sponsors are the Art institute and the music committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

The chorus will be costumed beautifully and the stage is to be especially decorated for the occasion. Paul Ray Jones is to accompany the chorus. Parker Klepinger will be chairman.

The concert will open with the presentation of Gounod's "O Divine Redeemer," Vittoria's "Hear, 'O My People" and Schuetky's "Send Forth Thy Spirit."

Other numbers to be precented are Woods' "When the Red, Red Robin," Serenade from Romberg's "The Student Prince," an old French song titled "Are You Sleeping, Brother John?" and "My Hero" from Oscar Straus's "The Chocolate Soldier."
