AUTO TAG SERVICE WILL BE PROVIDED

For the convenience of Inland employes the Personnel Department will furnish 1938 auto license service. This service will be similar to that of the past and will start Monday, March 14.

The fees for the 1938 tags will be the same as those charged in 1937. Car owners will be charged the license fee, determined by the horsepower of their vehicle, plus a 25-cent issuing fee, which goes to the deputy registrar issuing the license.

Rates for the tags are as follows:
\$7.00 for cars of 25 horsepower and less.

\$10.00 for cars of more than 25 horsepower and not more than 31 horsepower.

\$16.00 for cars of more than 31 horsepower.

In order to file an application Inland employes must bring their bill-of-sale and the required fee to the Personnel Office. The application will be taken one day and the license will be ready for delivery the next.

Schedule

To eliminate confusion a definite schedule for filing applications has been set up for the employes of each shift as follows:

Many Children Apply For Membership In Chorus; Regulations Necessary

The high degree of success experienced by the Inland Children's Chorus when presented on the Philharmonic Concert program and on our annual Christmas Party program, has increased by leaps and bounds the number of applicants who desire to receive this fine musical training. At the present time the Chorus is composed of 150 voices, with a number of applications for membership pending.

Due to this increase it has become necessary to establish certain regulations governing the selection and training of this group, as follows:

Eligibility

Membership in the Chorus will be limited to the following:

1. Members of the immediate families of Inland employes who meet entrance requirements.
2. A limited number of children of relatives of employes who have unusual talent.
3. A limited number of other children with exceptional talent who may be selected by the Director with the approval of the Management.

Size of Group

1. The Chorus will be limited to 150 voices. The objective is to have 75 girls and 75 boys. Until such time as the desired number of boys are secured, the number of girls may exceed 75.
2. The concert group will be limited to 100 voices to be selected by the Director.
3. In Addition to the Chorus of 150 a supplementary group of not to exceed 20 voices will be given training for a probationary period of three months. If at the conclusion of this probationary period they do not qualify for admission to the chorus they will be dropped.

Age Limit

1. Children under seven years of age will not be admitted.
2. Members of the Chorus will be dropped on September 1st following their sixteenth birthday.

Individual Scholarships

The Director will select a group of not more than five girls and five boys with exceptional talent to whom he will give private instruction—one lesson per week—as training for solo work. Scholarships will be granted for one season only but may be renewed from season to season on a competitive basis.
