We love seeing collaboration among community organizations. Here's one – just announced – that's pretty interesting.

It's called "ReImagining Works," and it's a collaboration between the Dayton Metro Library and the Dayton Art Institute.

"It's called 'ReImagining Works' because a library selection committee has chosen six works that are part of DAI's permanent collection for area residents to vote on for the E.C. Doran Branch in Old North Dayton currently under renovation," said Chuck Duritsch, manager of external relations for the library. "A regional artist will be com-

munity as well.

Duritsch says the project came to the library thanks to an anonymous donor's bequest. The Dayton Art Institute's proposal was selected because

"New Quilts from an Old Favorite 2013: Jacob's Ladder."

The Hayner, 301 W. Main St., Troy, will displaying 18 finalists and winning quilts by quilt-makers who responded to the challenge.

"Quilters from 10 states and three countries modified Jacob's Ladder block designs in imaginative ways, providing a wonderful look at the skills, techniques and creativity of today's quiltmakers," said the center's exhibit coordinator, Nancy Hutchins.

First place was awarded to Margaret Fetterhoff of Spring, Texas, for her quilt, "Green With Envy, A Tribute To Women in Fabric." The second-place quilt, "Peace, Love, & Rock 'n' Roll" by Karen Watts of Mayhill, N.M., is a nod to songs of the 1960s and early 1970s and it features an image of her husband playing his guitar. Quilters who'd

### Ohio Arts Council approves 112 grants totaling \$424,813

The Ohio Arts Council board has approved the third round of grants for fiscal year 2014 and grant ratifications for fiscal years 2014 and 2013. The OAC will award 112 grants totaling \$424,813 to support arts organizations, arts programs and artists across Ohio.

Organizations that receive OAC funds are required to match state tax dollars with additional public and private funds on a one-to-one basis.

A \$5,000 Individual Excellence Award grant went to Crystal Fuller of

Dayton and to Jody Rambo of Springfield.
