Capitol Discs Include Work By Bruckner

The first long-playing recording by an American firm and an American artist personnel of Bruckner's "Symphony No. 4," known as the "Romantic," has been released by Capitol records on a single disc. It is played by the Pittsburgh Symphony orchestra conducted by William Steinberg.

For the Christmas season Capitol has released an album carrying 19 encores in English, Latin, German and French. These are sung in their original settings by the Roger Wagner Chorale. The disc is titled "Joy to the World."

American Troubadour

Mark Taylor who is known as the American Troubadour, will appear on the program of the Christmas open house parties to be held Monday and Tuesday evenings at the Dayton Art institute.

Mr. Taylor will accompany himself with guitar or Irish harp as he tells old tales and sings old ballads. He is a member of University of Michigan's faculty.

The open house parties are arranged for children attending after-school classes at the Art institute and members of their families.

Inland Choir, Philharmonic In Concert

The Inland Children's chorus and the Dayton Philharmonic orchestra will present Christmas concert at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday in Memorial hall.

The chorus will make its first appearance under the direction of Joseph P. Geiger. Paul Katz will conduct the orchestra.

The first part of the concert is to be given by the orchestra which will present the overture to Menotti's "Amelia Goes to the Ball," Schumann's "Second Symphony," and Respighi's "Pines of Rome."

The chorus of 100 children will give the second part of the program. They will stand on a tiered platform and will be surrounded by silver trees tipped lavishly with blue lights. The boys will wear Eton suits and the girls, long-skirted Alice blue gowns.

"'Twas the Night Before Christmas," by Harry Simeone and in choral transcription by Tom Scott, will be the opening selection presented by the chorus which will sing, too, Yon's "Gesu Babino," Ralph E. Marryott's "Christmas Roundelay" and Reading's "Oh Come, All Ye Faithful."
