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Wheel Inserts, Exp. Engineering Have High Housekeeping Grades

The employees of Department 7, Wheel Inserts, and General Foreman, Frank Suter, after a prolonged absence, have returned to the winner's circle in the Plant-wide Housekeeping competition.

Wheel Inserts was rated first in the Manufacturing Division with a grade of 91 and thus shares First-Quarter honors with Department 31, Experimental Engineering and its Supervisor, G. R. Overman.

Experimental Engineering, a quarterly winner in 1959, led the Non-Productive departments with a high grade of 93. Dept. 25, William Johnston, Supervisor was 2nd in this section with an 89 and Dept. 34 under the supervision of W. L. Harrison finished 3rd at 87.7.

It was not easy for Wheel Inserts to take the top spot in Manufacturing. Department 15, Metal Trays, under General Foreman Frank Seitz tied with Wheel Inserts in the original ratings.

A regrading was necessary and Dept. 7 emerged victorious, 91.0 to 90.5. Depts. 91 and 92 were very close to the top with grades of 90.

Generally speaking, grades were above average. The entire plant was rated at 85.8. This brought words of commendation from S. A. Wright, Supervisor of Safety and Housekeeping, who with selected personnel conducts the periodic inspections.

Concern for the welfare of its employees and development of an outstanding occupational health program has earned General Motors the Industrial Medical Association's 1960 Health Achievement in Industry Award.

It is the highest management award given by the Medical Association.

The award was presented to Louis G. Seaton, vice president of GM in charge of Personnel Staff by Dr. Richard A. Suter of St. Louis.

Dr. Suter cited GM management for its enlightened attitude to-

ward occupational health and for dealing with employees as individuals, thinking of them as individuals and being concerned with their dignity as individuals.

The Corporation was also cited for its financial contributions for the establishment of the Institute of Industrial Health at the University of Michigan and for aiding the Sloan-Kettering Foundation, in evaluating the effects on health of exhaust fumes.

According to the latest tabulation, 2,783 of 5,018 people at this plant are buying bonds through the Payroll Savings Plan. This means that 55.5% are now participating, a gain of 12.7% since March 1.
